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In the last few years China has become an impressive player in global affairs. This has led to both cooperation and rivalry with the established great powers. This talk will outline how the US and the major European countries, such as Germany, view China's foreign policy on the global stage. The talk will also briefly discuss EU-China and US-China relations as well as transatlantic cooperation and differences of view on some major international issues.

Klaus Larres is the Richard M. Krasno Distinguished Professor of History and International Affairs at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, NC. Originally from Germany, he is also the Global Europe & Kissinger China Institute Fellow at the Woodrow Wilson Center in Washington, DC. Previously he held the Henry Kissinger Chair in Foreign Policy & International Relations at the Library of Congress in Washington, DC, was a member o the Institute for Advanced Study (IAS) in Princeton, NJ, and was a Visiting Fellow at Germany's leading think tank the German Institute for International and Security Affairs (SWP) in Berlin. He was also a Counselor and Senior Policy Adviser at the German Embassy in Beijing, China, was a Visiting Scholar at the Minda de Gunzburg Center for European Studies of Harvard University, and was a Visiting Professor at the Schwarzman Scholars Program at Tsinghua University. His major books include Churchill's Cold War: The Politics of Personal Diplomacy (2002) and Uncertain Allies: Nixon, Kissinger, and the Threat of a United Europe (2022).

China Crossroads hosts talks on all topics related to China, including business, foreign policy, and other areas as they relate to China, the idea being that China is both already a "crossroads" of the world and itself at a "crossroads" in terms of its future global influence.
